

# HEADTEACHER'S ADDRESS



As we approach the end of term, you can see from the Newsletter that there is lots to celebrate, enjoy and reflect upon. The learning has been fantastic this term and I am always impressed at how hard our children concentrate and work in their lessons. The quality of their participation, reflection and involvement in learning is outstanding. Our children are a beacon of light for the 'youth' of today.

At St Edmund's, learning is never confined to just the academic curriculum. There have been many wonderful extra-curricular events and trips this term, with massively high numbers of students involved. This week we performed at the Guildhall with 'Soundsational', a venue we visited a few weeks earlier and won the heats of 'Dance Live!' (Good Luck to all for the Final on Wednesday 26th April!). Shakespeare in schools at the New Theatre Royal, 'The Merchant of Venice' was another stunning performance of talented, confident and brave individuals. There have been a huge number of sporting opportunities, with students showing real determination, skill and resilience. Congratulations to all, and my thanks to staff who give so much extra time for these events.

Our spiritual development has been interwoven into all aspects of what we do, with numerous events and our daily acts of prayer and worship. Observing tutor group assemblies and tutor group prayer has been at times very moving and a truly soul warming experience. These moments of prayer really reflect student's faith, and its importance to them in their daily lives and interactions. Assemblies during this Lenten Season have given students the opportunity to pray, reflect and think about the wider society and their place in it. This week we have focused on preparing for Palm Sunday and Holy Week and we will be celebrating Easter during our Stations of the Cross service on Friday. During this service we will walk with Jesus, and by uniting in his suffering, become stronger Christians, and have a better understanding of suffering across the wide world.

We have been talking with students about how Lent is not just about giving something up but about positive change. Improving our lives and that of others with love, understanding and spiritual resilience. Pope Francis said 'Lent comes to us at a time to change course, to recover the ability to react to the evil that always challenges us. Lent is a time to turn away from sin. Allowing that some focus and resilience to enter our daily life and work.'

The Cultural Awareness day this week was organised totally by students with a number of events / activities taking place throughout the day. An incredible achievement and uplifting (although wet!) day.

Finally, thank you to parents for your incredible support this term. All these little things make a huge difference and allow our children to flourish academically, socially and spiritually. # T Level Nursing Masterclass

On the 14th March 2 lovely Nurse Tutors came into St Edmund's to deliver a 2 hour T Level Nursing Masterclass to some of our lovely Year 9 pupils.

The class was brilliant. The pupils learnt how to listen for a pulse (MUCH harder than you think it is going to be!), how to bandage a leg/foot/hand or arm injury and how to take a reading of someone's blood oxygen levels. The also looked into testing (fake!) urine samples and by reading the results on the litmus test were able to make informed judgements about what a possible diagnosis may be.

# CHAPLAINCY

'And now I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. If you have love for one another, then everyone will know that you are my disciples.' (John 13:34-35) The above Scripture passage comes to mind when I think about this term. I look at how God's love has worked through the staff and students of the school and reached out to others.

Our Bamenda Day for Year 8 was a wonderful experience for all. Staff and Students were involved in a day of activities focused on learning about the situation in Bamenda and the school with which we are twinned, John Paul II. The whole concept and theology of Catholic Social Teaching was reinforced and students learnt more about how, 'The Church has always had the duty of scrutinising the signs of the times and of interpreting them in the light of the Gospel.' (Gaudium et Spes #4) This we did by being aware of the needs of others, writing postcards to John Paul II school and raising money for their school by a sponsored Fun Run. Well done Year 8.



We launched our Lenten CAFOD fundraising. Each Tutor Group put forward ideas to raise money. Our fundraising will support all of CAFOD's endeavours to help our global family. There were so many activities such as: sponsored silences, cake selling, entertainment at break times, football competitions, guess the teacher, to name but a few. Each Year group had their own Reconciliation Services. It was a beautiful, prayerful and reflective experience. Students and staff had time to reflect upon their lives and to give thanks for many things as well as seeing areas in their lives where they could make a few changes to become their best selves. During the Service, students were given an opportunity to write a card to someone who they felt may need cheering up, or to say thank you to, or to say they were thinking and praying for them. It was lovely seeing those cards being passed to staff and students. At the end of the Service, students had the opportunity to attend individual reconciliation. 


# ENGLISH

We then practiced our averted vision on the Pleiades (looking halfway between the Seven Sisters and Aldebaran) and practiced our pointers to navigate the night sky too. # DANCE LOVE






