How did the pupils do?

The overall attitude, respect and behaviour from the students was first class. They came openminded, albeit a little nervous! They took the feedback really well, were asking some thought provoking questions and were keen to listen. Definitely some great characters there in the mix!

What was your highlight?

I think the stand-out moment for me was how many of the students were interested in STEM areas. This was an area that never interested us or was pushed as a career focus when I was younger. Aware as I am of the shortage in the industry, it was really positive to see how many want to go down this route.

What was it like visiting your old school?

I would say it was a bit nostalgic, however, where I left 13 years ago now, my memories are a little hazy! In all honesty, it was great to be back and to see the improvement to the school's infrastructure was brilliant. Seeing some of my old teachers and speaking to them as an adult was fantastic too, a real full-circle moment! I think when you're younger you're naive as to how big an impact they can have. It certainly brought back some good memories and it was great to have the opportunity to give back.

For Year 9's community project this year we set our sights a little closer to home than our chosen charity of Bamenda last year and wanted to help those who live in Portsmouth. As a year group we raised money in order to buy mince pies and hot drinks to give out for free before Christmas. Over two days students went down to Commercial Road and spoke to the local community, offering them a warm drink and some of their time. Money left over was then given to Chaplain Fiona to support local families in the run up to Christmas. As a year group we are very charitable and following the huge success off Bamenda day last year wanted to have an impact. The local community were very appreciative of our time and could not believe a school would come down and pass out drinks and food just to be kind. This term Year 7 have been designing and making personalised wooden boxes. They have been learning to use 2D design in the computer room to create their personalised lid. After making their box students produced very complexed isometric drawings and 3rd Angle Orthographic drawings of their designs using a drawing board to British Standard conventions.

This term Year 8 pupils have been making their wooden push pull vehicles. They have been designing their own product and learning the following skills: cutting, shaping, drilling, and smoothing. Their numeracy skills have really been tested as Year 8 were required to do a lot of measuring too. Well done Year 8!

This term Year 9 have been learning about CAD / CAM and technology drawing. They used computer aided design to design a clock and our laser cutter manufactured their product.

Film Studies



'I'm really enjoying the Film GCSE because it's creative and in the first few weeks I learnt a lot about the history of film since 1895 and how a lot of the technology has changed. I also learnt about the cinematography (which is the camera shots and angles), different types of diegetic and non-diegetic sound in film and the importance of costume, props, facial expressions and body language to show a character.

After we had this introduction to film, we then had the task of filming and editing the opening of a horror film in 3 lessons- we planned our ideas and storyboarded it first and then went out and took lots of different shots such as a wide shot of a moody sky or a close up of a terrified face or an extreme close up of a (pretend) weapon or blood stain and then began the process of editing it and adding sound.

I took responsibility for the editing and the first thing I created was the title 'One by One' as it gave the audience the idea that victims would be picked off which is what happens. By using lots of low angles of feet we can see the killer is tracking their victim but we never reveal the character fully so that it creates more tension as no one knows who the serial killer is as they are masked. We learnt that using a high angle can make a character look more powerful and a low angle makes them look smaller and weaker. The high angle looking down at a pile of 'pretend' bodies (everyone kept very still!) was chilling and I added sinister music to make this more tense.

In the editing I used some slow motion and added jump scares with sound effects to make the audience jump. I also sped it up so at the end the tension and suspense grow.

We were proud of our finished piece and got some great feedback from the rest of the class and the teacher about how we had very effectively used our knowledge of camera work, sound and editing to create the opening of a horror genre. Everyone said the music was really creepy and as it got faster the audience felt more fear \circ


