Our Year 9 Tutor Groups have been leading the Angelus and in so doing offered prayers for





Past Pupil Success

Mr Graham received an email from a past student informing us of his success after leaving the school in July 2017 and he would like to share this fantastic achievement with you.

In April this year, I reached my goal of selection to the British Shooting GB Target Sprint squad. Being in the GB squad now means I have the opportunity to compete abroad. This June saw the start of my international competitions, where in Italy I made the finals and placed ninth, ahead of the rest of my team mates. In June I will be travelling to additional competitions in Germany and the Netherlands, culminating with the World Championships in South Korea in September.



Target Sprint is the internationally recognised air rifle discipline that combines running with target shooting. Competitors run 400 m then shoot 5 targets with an air rifle from a distance of 10 m. They then run again, shoot and then finish with one more 400 m lap. The sport is hoping that Target Sprints is introduced into the 2024 Olympics and my ultimate goal is to be part of the first GB team to compete in the Olympics when it is introduced.



I would like to take this opportunity to say a massive thank you to yourself and the rest of the staff at St Edmund's who helped shape me into the hard working and focused person I am today. As I am sure you can imagine, in order to compete at this level, it takes many hours of training and discipline and I believe that St Edmund's gave me the tools I needed to achieve what I have as well as the confidence to believe that anything is possible.
