Brexit Chaos

The designated Brexit Day, March 29th 2019, has been pushed back, leaving the British public in a state of varied emotions. Disagreements have taken place in the Commons; despite having two years to agree to a deal, MPs seem no closer to agreement than how they started.

The EU has given Britain two new deadlines. If MPs agree to Theresa May's deal by next week, the EU will give Britain up until May 21st to make final arrangements before leaving. However, this is the same deal that has failed on the two previous occasions. Thus, the hopes are not high on a third successful attempt. In a final attempt to get her plan through, Theresa May has said that she will resign if her plan is passed. She hopes that this will convince a few wavering MPs to vote for her plan.

Although, if Britain does not agree to Mrs May's deal, the EU have passed the deadline of the 12th of April. This will require the Commons to agree on a different deal to the current plan in two weeks. Having failed to agree a plan in two years. Also, this seems unlikely.

The only remaining option if neither deadline is met is Britain to leave with 'no deal'. Ironically, in the two years of discussions, the only agreement between MPs is that this is not acceptable and a deal must be made.



The root cause of the problem is that MPs find it easier to decide what they do not want rather than what they would like. Consequently, this has caused the dilemma that no single plan has ever received a majority vote. At this eleventh hour, a few MPs have developed an alternative approach called 'indicative' votes. This alternative plan, means that instead of MPs being given a binary vote (agree or disagree) on a single issue, instead, a selection of eight or more possible plans are submitted. Then, asked to indicate their agreement to all eight plans simultaneously. Hopefully, this will be a mechanism that will allow MPs to see which plans have any chance of success and rule out those that will never pass.

As Brexit continues to stay in the headlines, if only to keep reporting that there is no solution to report and negotiations are underway. The uncertainty of this event leads the public to question the integrity of parliament and if politicians have the best interests of the country at heart.

Spring Cleaning

Spring cleaning means cleaning any room or house thoroughly, it was thought to have originated in Iran and China, where it marked the beginning of a new year. It could be also used metaphorically, symbolising a way of decluttering our minds and being at peace within ourselves.

Iran start their new year with rituals, festivals and elaborate customs. Spring cleaning begins on the 21st of March, the vernal equinox: where there are more hours of sunlight each day. Pouches of flowers and herbs are draped over doors, in order to refresh the stale air of last year. Ancient symbols of fire and water are painted on door steps; this is to show purification, physically and mentally.

Others believe that this tradition was started by the Jews, where the house was cleansed in preparation for Passover. Passover is the most important festival for Jews, where they remember how the poor Israelite children were rescued from slavery by Moses and the plagues that came upon Israel. After they had broken free from the pharaoh, they were starving for 40 days and nights until bread started to fall from the sky. The Jews recall this momentous occasion by removing all grains from the house by candle light, the night before Passover. Through the ages Jews began to thoroughly clean their homes to show respect for God.

The Chinese believe that cleaning before the new year brings good fortunes. They sweep floors and wipe away any bad luck that is lingering from the previous year. They then restrain from sweeping their floors a week after the new year, to ensure that they don't sweep away any good fortune the new year has brought.

Before central heating was invented, people sealed off their home completely from the cold of winter. They were forced to clean their homes because of the smoke induced by coal and oil needed to maintain the fire. Spring, with its warmer days and lighter evening was, and still is, an opportunity to make a dwelling where the smell of stale smoke hung from the walls, fresh again. Windows and doors can be opened, so dust can be cleared outside, and washed cloth and linen will dry quicker now that it can be hung in the breeze.

Could it be that so many different cultures embark on rituals and celebrations that involve spring cleaning because, this time of year is simply the best time to refresh and clean your home?



Christchurch Shooting

Unfortunately, on Friday 15th March, 49 people were killed in two terrorist attacks at mosques. This also resulted to 48 people being injured, causing it to be the worst shooting in New Zealand's history.

The shooting has also brought to light some other troubling topics, such as how the internet's culture caused this to happen. The 28-year-old attacker, who won't be named here, broadcast live footage of his attack on Facebook. Moreover, the terrorist posted a manifesto to online forum page 8chan shortly before his attack; and in it, he made reference to popular online trends, as well as made ironic comments about his far-right fascist views.

On his livestream beforehand, he cried 'Remember, lads, subscribe to PewDiePie', a reference to the Youtuber Felix Kjellberg; who asked his subscribers to help promote his channel to fight the corporate company T-Series from becoming the most subscribed to channel on video-sharing platform YouTube.

Whilst it is sure that Felix didn't mean to encourage this violent type of behaviour, the fact of the matter is that this Youtuber and the culture surrounding him, encouraged the toxicity within the attacker.



Obviously, the Internet cannot be totally censored from all sorts of jokes, and in fact many people have claimed that the Youtuber PewDiePie has in fact helped them to overcome negative mental health issues, however it I clear that sites such as YouTube and 8chan must try to help prevent situations like this from reoccurring, as well as make sure that they provide help to those who need it.

Moreover, the way that we use social media is also being questioned by this tragic event. After the livestream, video clips were shared across social media platforms such as Instagram and Snapchat, and while this cannot be prevented, and while the sites in question did all they could to take down these clips, it was still appalling. Although it will be very difficult to do without completely censoring the Internet, these sites should be trying to develop a way to preemptively stop these clips from being uploaded in the first place.

Finally, news sites have also faced criticism for posting edited versions of the attackers video, as well as links to the afore mentioned mantra. The Sun, Daily Mail and the Daily Mirror all posted footage on their website, however Assistant Commissioner Neil Basu said that it was wrong to 'hide behind the mantra' of free speech. His fear is that if people had access to the propaganda created by the manifesto and video, then this would incite far right opinions and ideals within the consumer.

Overall, due to the close link between this tragic event in New Zealand and online culture, many opportunities have been presented that allow us to evaluate the world we live in and the effect the internet has had on it; as well as giving us the opportunity to criticise media platforms, and the effect that they have both on the individual and society.


Top 3 Rom-Com Movies on Netflix:

What's your favourite...?


