The trip was split into two sections, a week on a community project and a week spent hiking... up a mountain. For the first week we briefly enjoyed the hustle and bustle of the Moroccan capital before heading off to a small town of Goulmima, where we worked on establishing bike racks within a school. Not only did we complete construction work, but we got really involved with the community, tasting and cooking the local cuisine, playing sports with the locals and going on a tour of a nomadic camp. A great example of this was when, halfway through working in the heat, we all got involved in a water fight with the local employees.

After the community phase we began hiking. But this wasn't hiking up hills, instead we were hiking up a 4,167m tall mountain. Admittedly it was very hard, but not only did it make it even more gratifying when we all reached the peak, but it also helped bring the group closer together. The view from the top was simply stunning, and the journey up and down taught me loads of practical skills that I don't know where else I would have learned.

This trip was one of the best experiences of my life, and while beforehand I was really worried about what would happen; looking back I am so thankful that I pushed myself out of my comfort zone and did something new. Not only did I have a great experience, but I learnt so many skills and qualities, as well as gained a huge boost to my confidence.

HEADTEACHER'S ADDRESS

Watching the Great South run last Sunday after Mass, one could but not feel a sense of camaraderie and strive for achievement. My congratulations to all those who trained so hard and gave so much towards their achievement. Reflecting on life here at St Edmund's, there are many similarities with such events. All of our children are on their own individual journey through school. They are all unique, have differing God given talents and grow/develop at different speeds. Over their 5 years at St Edmund's each person will have amazing experiences, challenges and the opportunity to grow spiritually. These mixed messages, double standards tend to come to fruition in that final challenging year of GCSE's. This is especially the case where families have selected the school based upon academic outcomes and pay 'lip service' to the 'real soul' of St Edmund's; our spirituality. Our faith is the rock upon which our success is built. Once again thanks to parents, governors,

staff and our wider family who support all that we do.

A special thanks to the Friends of St Edmund's who are working hard to organise a Prom Fayre (see notices page). The aim is to continue to raise funds to provide better facilities for our children. Finally, an update on the new building. Our summer works programme completed (new Science labs, 3 classrooms refurbished and normal maintenance). We have a new steel frame up and completed. This additional space/improvement is vital to ensure that the breadth/depth of options the school runs is maintained and that class sizes in core subjects are kept very low. We will update the website to show the development of the new facility for our children.



Year 11 Geography - Urban Fieldwork

On the 25th of September, year 11 geography students set out to The Hard, Guildhall Square and Commercial Road with the hopes of completing pedestrian counts, surveys and land maps at each site. We spend the day collecting primary data **trying to prove our hypothesis 'land use in Portsmouth is changing because of an increase in university students'.**

We had the opportunity to explore our local area and consider how it has changed in recent years. Upon coming back to school, we analysed our data, looking at the answers to the 80+ surveys that were completed by members of the general public. It was a very interesting day, giving us all an insight into how our area is changing and the visual differences in Portsmouth. The whole class enjoyed the day out and broadened our knowledge on our urban area.





Year 7 were offered the opportunity to take part in a History trip to Portchester Castle to enhance their knowledge of how England changed after the Norman Invasion which are the modules they have studied this half term.

On Tuesday 8th October a fresh cohort of 20 Year 9 boys embarked on a new programme of Marginal Gains.




They were given an introduction to the Marginal Gains theory and then participated in some exercises where they needed to apply a **'marginal gain' in order to** improve their performance.
