General Election 2019: What happened?

In 2011 Parliament passed the Fixed-term Parliaments Act which was designed to make sure elections were held every five years. This then scheduled the next election for 2015, and the successive one for 2020. Instead, Brexit happened. In the four years since 2015 we've now had 2 general elections as well as 2 Conservative leadership contests. Why, and what's happened now?

On the 23rd June 2016, under the PM at the time, David Cameron, the country held a referendum on Brexit. Beforehand the Prime Minister had stated he would resign if the country voted for Brexit; the country voted for Brexit. After this Theresa May was elected as leader of the Conservative party, but she believed many people had doubts about whether her and her party deserved to still be in power after Cameron resigned. However, she too resigned soon after due to the blocking of many of her Brexit deals by Parliament. Finally, Boris Johnson was elected as leader of the Conservative Party and thus Prime Minister in the summer of 2019. The problem was that not only had the Conservative Party not achieved a majority in the previous election, some conservative MPs refused to back the new Prime Minister. This meant Mr Johnson couldn't muster enough votes to pass his Brexit deal, and so instead called a new general election hoping that the Conservatives could win a larger majority.

Now we know why this election happened, it's time to find out what did happen. Firstly, Mr Johnson won his majority (of 365 seats, a majority of 80) that he had been hoping for, the largest since 1987's election. Meanwhile, the Labour Party scored 203 seats while the newly formed Brexit Party received none.

From the leaders there has been a variety of different responses: a victorious Mr Johnson has thanked the voters for their trust, Jeremy Corbyn has announced he will stand down as leader of the Labour party early next year and Jo Swinson lost her seat, causing the Liberal Democratic Party to be momentarily leaderless.

So what happens now? After the election the Prime Minister has decided to make small changes to his cabinet, and then he will move onto completing his campaign tagline of 'Get Brexit Done' before January 31st. Whilst Jeremy Corbyn has stated that he will step down next year, many people have called for him to step down immediately, the Labour leader says he believes the 'responsible thing to do is not to walk away from the whole thing.' Finally, Nicola Sturgeon, leader of the Scottish National Party is calling for an independence referendum for Scotland, saying that the PM has 'no right' to oppose it.

For the moment though, the next five years of Tory rule doesn't seem to exist past the 31st January, and it seems to be a waiting game until then.

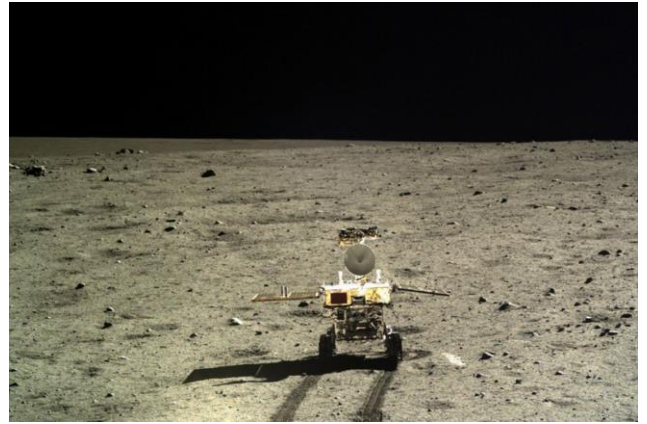
