Boris the Builder By Philip Collins White

As mayor of London, one of Boris Johnson's most well known introductions was the Boris Bikes. Now as the metaphorical mayor of our whole country, Mr Johnson is introducing more infrastructural plans: the HS2, Boris Bridge and a Heathrow expansion.

The HS2 isn't a new concept, with the Department for Transport creating the company behind the High Speed Railway in 2010. Now, 10 years later, Mr Johnson is planning on creating a new high-speed link between London, Birmingham, Manchester and Leeds. This 400m long route is expected to allow 1,100-seat-trains to travel at 250mph, 14 times an hour. Originally, this project was estimated to cost £56bn, but already the estimate has risen to £106bn.



The fact that the route passes through approximately 70 constituencies means there are a lot of parliamentarian barriers to cross, especially with groups such as Stop HS2 and HS2 Action Alliance saying this will increase carbon emissions and decrease the proportion of jobs outside of London, before it reaches the end of Phase 1 (London to Birmingham) by 2031.

Whilst HS2 is an old idea, the Boris Bridge was introduced with the titular PM. Already officials are looking the idea of a more-than-£20bn bridge linking Scotland and Northern Island, and already critics have arisen from both politicians and builders. Both the Northern Island Infrastructure Minister and Scotland Transport Secretary expressed concerns over the fact that neither of their departments were consulted before the bridge's announcement. Many concerns have risen over the fact that the bridge will pass near Portpatrick in the ocean, where 1.2 million tonnes of munitions have been dumped, as well as two tonnes of concrete drums with chemical and radioactive waste. Finally, the struts will also have to be 300m deep, the size of the shard.

The Heathrow expansion is the most developed project so far, and now it's been declared unlawful by the Court of Appeal on the 27th February. While Heathrow is hoping to take its case to the Supreme Court, its plans for a third runway have been shut down over concerns over the increase of noise and sound pollution, as well as environmental pollution. In addition to this, it seemed directly at odds with the government's plan to become carbon neutral by 2050. While this plan has not been directly endorsed by Boris Johnson, it was approved by Theresa May's conservative government in 2015.

Dear MP,

As a long term resident of the beautiful coastal city of Portsmouth, visiting Commercial Road multiple times a week on my almost daily commute, I am writing to express my concern about the growing homeless population in not only our neighboring city, but across the country as a whole. I understand that many people may lack compassion for the homeless, stating that it is a 'personal choice', a 'lifestyle' or even their own fault and I respect that you may share this sentiment privately, but I beg you to think about the 135,000 children who are expected to become homeless in the next year and fight to better the way our nation deals with this problem.

A 2018 study by the organisation 'homeless', reported that 40% of all local authorities found that the scale of youth homelessness has increased and over half of the service providers in our country found that they had a higher demand for services from people aged 16-24 years old. Respondents to an anonymous survey identified a lack of affordable housing, a lack of supported accommodation and the reforms of the welfare benefit system to be reasons for an increased number of homeless youths; are these not all things controlled by the government, Mr.MP?

Tell me what are you doing about this crisis? These children, the future of our society, are struggling in the streets, on hard park benches, in concrete doorways, and what are you doing?

I am not a government official. I have no experience of Parliament or how the legal system works- but I know that you do. You have an impact. I am asking you to amplify my voice with yours and speak for the hundreds of thousands of young people whose plight reflects the issues I have raised in this letter. These children do not deserve such hardships, they deserve love and reassurance, and if that is not possible, they at least deserve shelter, a roof over their heads; they are human.

Please Mr. MP, take this into consideration, raise it with your peers, and serve your constituents, regardless of whether they live in a five-bedroom home or under a bridge, we are all deserving.

Tragic Death of Caroline Flack

"Not everyone is going to like you all the time, not everyone is going to think you're beautiful, but there is a difference between opinion and abuse." -Caroline Flack

Caroline Flack, 40-year-old TV presenter, ended her own life on Saturday 15th February. Poplar Coroner's Court heard that Flack was "found lying on her back" after an apparent hanging in her northeast London home. A police car had been flagged down in Stoke Newington and CPR was attempted by officers, then continued by paramedics. Coroner's officer Sandra Polson said she was pronounced dead at the scene.

After her suicide on Saturday, social media has been the prominent explanation for her death -as have the mainstream media and the Crown Prosecution Service as they pressed ahead with the trial after she was charged with assaulting her boyfriend -a charge of which her partner did not support the prosecution. Many witnesses stated that, on the date of her last court hearing, when she pleaded not guilty, the TV presenter seemed to be struggling with the media attention and courtroom pressure.

In an unpublished Instagram post, which was shared by her family, Flack stated that her "whole world and future was swept from under my feet" following her arrest. Flowers have been left outside the door of herb former house whilst many social media personalities and celebrities have publicly shared their condolences for the family and demand that more is done in the future to prevent anymore deaths at the result of internet trolling.

Back in 2015, Flack was not on a high after reaching another peak in her career of hosting her first live edition of The X Factor, instead she was in tears after looking at social media.

"The reaction was quite overwhelming because I didn't think people would be talking about how I look, how I stand, how I walk or how I laugh". -Caroline Flack

Hair salons across the country have stopped stocking celebrity gossip magazines after her death, many posting their decision onto social media. Ms Donoghue, 41-year-old hairdresser stated that, "when I thought about Caroline and the impact these magazines have had on her life, I wanted to make a change."

Additionally, positive changes have been sparked across the country, such as a petition calling for "Caroline's Law", which pleads for it to become an offence for the media to "knowingly and relentlessly bully a person" has received more than 750,000 signatures.
