On Wednesday 13th October a group Year 9 & 10 pupils had the privilege of taking part in Project Orpheus which is run by Portsmouth City Council.

"It was an absolute pleasure and privilege to work with your students and staff on Tuesday. Thank you for being so welcoming."



The purpose of the sessions was to allow young people the chance to discuss and air their views on the topics or issues that interest them, fascinate them or anger them. Essentially they were given a voice and an opportunity to discuss controversy in a safe setting that would allow for agreement and respectful disagreement.

This work is part of a 3 year funded project named Orpheus, working in

partnership with other coastal cities and universities within France, Belgium and Netherlands. Our students were looking to trial engaging activities using innovative approaches to consider methods of conflict resolution.

This project is supported by local charities and schools, in addition to the Home Office and the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, who will distribute the findings when they become available. The students had a chance to debate, discuss topics which were of interest to them.

Jon Nicholas is Head of Curriculum at Tim Parry Johnathan Ball Peace Foundation- with an interest in Drama and peace processes, his active engaging approach was the perfect antidote to remote learning.

HEADTEACHER'S ADDRESS

This first half term has passed by at lightning speed and has been much more like normal life at St Edmund's. Overall attendance has been high (94% this half term) and after a spike in Covid cases upon returning (picked up through testing), the numbers have remained relatively low. This has meant less disruption/loss of learning for the vast majority of students and allowed for more consistency.

Over the summer holidays and into this half term we have continued to improve the facilities for our children. The Learning Resource Centre (Library) has been totally refurbished and modernised including updating ICT facilities for students. The boys and girls toilets have been upgraded and given that 'hotel standard' makeover.

We have upgraded our catering systems to speed up the efficiency of students paying and have more time to enjoy their lunch. Our out of date telephone system has been upgraded. One new feature of this is that all conversations are recorded and stored. This will be a fantastic new safeguarding feature and allow parents and staff to ensure the accuracy of all verbal communications.

Our final ICT improvements involved adding soundbars to all classrooms to improve the sound and audio quality. This should now give better consistency of experience when video/film clips are being used as part of a lesson.

After a lengthy wait for materials, we have just completed our installation of a new bike shed by the Eagle Gate. This was a key area identified by the students as a provision they wanted expanding and will ensure that all bikes can be left covered, safe (as possible) and accessible.

During our recent Open Morning a number of visitors commented upon not just the facilities but the quality of the provision and spaces for our children. Students look after these incredibly well and know that chewing gum (and energy drinks) are the key food items not allowed in school.

Our Year 7 students have settled in fantastically and adapted well to 'Big School'. This in part due to our transition and the summer school as well as the support of the whole of the St Edmund's family.

We have been blessed by being able to hold retreats for both Years 7 & 9 this half term, as well as singing again in assembly. Our spirituality and faith are central to daily life here at St Edmund's. Not just in moments of prayer but in all our interactions. This is something to always remember when dealing with our differences or resolving issues/problems. Many of these continue to arise from the use of social media. As is our policy, we will always deal with these issues within school. Our support in terms of well-being often can be 'fuelled' by social media and the grounding parents, friends and staff provide is very important within the world we live in.

Looking ahead to next half term we will be building upon learning, progress and spiritual growth. There will be a mixture of online and face to face meetings/events. Having had direct advice from the Local Authority and feedback from parents, e-scooters will no longer be allowed on the school site. A new Governors Policy relating to bikes/e-scooters can be found here: https://www.saintedmunds.org.uk/home/school-policies Having looked into this, there is an issue regarding the legality of their use. Whilst this is a parental matter, Governors have agreed with the Local Authority/parents that these should no longer be permitted on the school site. Having witnessed students leaving school on them (often with friends on the back), this I believe will be a positive step to keep children safe when travelling to and from school.

Finally, my thanks for all of your support and the constant encouragement you give. We have seen some amazing

homework continue this half term.


So, as you can see we have been trying to live out our Spiritual Theme:



The beginning of this academic year has been a real joy as students have transitioned into Year 8 in the most calm, mature manner ever! What a start, and long may it last!



IT TEAM

Another Busy Summer for the IT team preparing the schools IT infrastructure for another year ahead.

We focused on 4 main projects this summer, a new cashless catering system, new telephone system, installing new soundbars into the majority of classrooms and the Library refurbishment.

Catering System

We have had our current catering system for many years and it was becoming difficult to maintain with aging hardware and an old database. The new Catering system required us to enroll all staff and students again but with a new snappy interface and brand new up to date hardware we are already starting to see a reduction in queue times for students!



Telephone System

Although our old telephone system used digital handsets instead of traditional analogue BT phones, the system still used old BT lines out of the school which are due to be switched off nationally in 2026. We decided

to move this Summer to a full VOIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) solution moving away from the old BT lines to fully internet-based phone lines. This has brought a whole host of new features to the school which will improve the way we can communicate with parents.



We upgraded the sound facilities in most classrooms moving away from old big Amp and speaker sets to nice new sound bars which are better suited to delivering effective sound throughout the classroom.

Library Refurbishment

This year saw the refurbishment of the Library including an upgrade to the IT Facilities available to students. We replaced the old projector and pull-down screen with a State of the Art 86" Touch Screen, a new Digital interactive information totem so students can check our stock of books with a swipe of their finger, new laptops and computers with 27" screens!



Every year the IT department produces a series of new outdoor banners for the school. This year we produced

two, one for the area near the Wright Block, and a second near the Pond/ Quiet area. This is on top of the window artwork that has been created for the school this year.

This is just a small sample of the work carried out each Summer in preparation for the start of the school year, we constantly look for ways to exploit current technology and trends to improve teaching and learning in



With our wallpaper art, we wanted to raise awareness about the problems of food waste and what people within our school could do to reduce food waste within our community.

As a part of our citizenship project, we spread posters all around the school that highlighted the issues that food wastage brought globally (e.g. 1/3 of all food is wasted, how it the amount of food that is wasted cost a collective of trillions and release copious amounts of Methane and Carbon Dioxide into the atmosphere and contributing to global warming). PSYCHOLOGY

Another busy year has started within Psychology. After 4 years of being delivered, Psychology has become fully integrated into St Edmund's. After disruption to the practical side of the course due to Covid it has been fantastic to see pupils being able to apply their skills and knowledge.

Year 10's have been busy learning about the development of the brain and how this effects learning. They have been able to apply their knowledge to experiments to see how praise affects our learning. They had to take on the role of experimenter and participants and it was great to see them applying all the skills they have been developing. It turns out process praise is the way to success.



Year 11's have continued their excellent work from last year. They have been looking into the topic of Social Influence and what can guide and change our behaviour. This has been a very hard-hitting topic with applications made to riots and the Holocaust which the year 11's have been able to deal with in a mature way.

Some of the main questions covered were: Who is your real self? Why do we change for other people? Should we always do what we are told?

After a fantastic start to the year there are many exciting times ahead. Year 11 will start to study Criminal Psychology and Sleep and Dreaming whilst the year 10's look at Memory, Psychological Problems and Neuropsychology. Well done to all the students studying Psychology over the last couple of years.

The aim of the school attendance campaign is to raise awareness about the importance of school attendance for children's attainment, achieving aspirations and general wellbeing. The coronavirus pandemic has not gone away, but the government's emphasis is now on minimising disruption to children's education and encouraging full attendance.

If your child develops a habit of regular school attendance from the beginning, they'll have a positive attitude at school and beyond. Evidence shows that children who attend regularly are more successful, not only in school, but in all areas of life. Missing school means not only missing out on lessons, but also friendships, clubs, trips and all the other opportunities that school has to offer.

As parents, you have a very important part to play in encouraging and supporting your child to ensure they understand the importance of regular attendance from an early age. You can help them to maintain that attitude throughout their school life and into their work life.

We are committed to ensuring that every child gets the chance to go to school to help them to get the best possible start to life. Please speak to us if you have any worries about getting your child in to school.

Top tips to help prevent absence

- talk to your child about how important it is to attend school
- inspire them to think about what they would like to be when they grow up, and how school can help with that
- ask regularly about how school is going
- ensure they have a good sleep routine, eat healthily and exercise regularly
- help them to get everything they need ready for school the night before
- use the NHS guidance on illness
- reassure them that the school has plans in place to reduce the spread of infections and encourage them to stick to the school's guidance for infection prevention find out more from your school's website
- book all holidays outside of term time
- book medical and dental appointments outside school hours if possible and if not possible, ensure your child attends school before and after the appointment
- if your child complains of boredom, contact their class teacher, form teacher or head of year to find out more
- provide a good environment for study at home and ensure they have time set aside for homework
- find out if your child wants to avoid school for a reason that they're frightened to tell you about perhaps they're being bullied.
- work with the school to address any attendance issues to ensure they don't miss out










As part of our coursework for Child Development, we are working on our own play activities to help observe the different types of development in children from 0-5 years with a focus on physical, intellectual, social and emotional development. Recently, we were given the exciting opportunity to carry out our own observation of two lovely little boys

In year 9 Teresa and Newman came joint 1st with 31 appearances, followed by John Paul and Damien who both had 22 appearances.

Examinations

Key Stage 2 SATs were cancelled along with the GCSE examinations this summer. This means that we have a very limited amount of information regarding your child's performance from primary school. As a school we use Key Stage 2 data to set appropriate targets for all subjects from Year 7 to Year 11. This is tightly linked to Government expectations regarding student progress and the Progress 8 measure. Setting these targets has ensured that students maximise their progress in each year and is the reason why St Edmund's has sat in the top 8% of schools nationally for the last 5 years.

In order to supplement data we have, we are intending to run GL CAT4 tests (Cognitive Ability Tests) over three weeks from the week commencing 1st November. The CAT tests are made up of three 45 minute tests that are taken online and they assess a student's reasoning abilities. There is no revision or preparation to be completed by the students in advance. We do not want the students to be worried about these tests, we will be supporting them through them.

The result of the CAT tests will be utilised by the school to support the target setting process and also provide some accurate information regarding reading and spelling ages.
