
Grace and Dalia look at the best places to remember, remember the 5th November...

On the 5th November 1605, Guy Fawkes attempted to assassinate King James I of England. This plan failed because Guy Fawkes was found in the cellar where the gunpowder was hidden. Himself, and others were sentenced to death.



How do we celebrate in London?

Across Great Britain, bonfire night is celebrated every 5th November to commemorate the failure of The Gunpowder Plot. These are some ways we do this:

- Firework displays
- Lighting bonfires
- Burn an effigy on a fire to represent Guy Fawkes

The Great A South Run

Lily interviews some members of staff about their experience of The Great South Run.

Most people have probably heard of The Great South Run. If not, then I'm here to give you some information about it:

The Great South Run is an annual 10 mile road running race, which takes place in Portsmouth and was first launched in 1990.

This race has continued to take place throughout the years. It was created by former British athlete Brendan Foster

This year the race took place on the 16th and 17th of October, which gave hundreds and thousands of people the chance to participate.

Not only can adults take part in this race, but children can too. The junior and mini run gives younger children the opportunity to also run in their own race. This can help children gain fitness skills and teach them to push themselves past their limits in order to accomplish what they want to.

I spoke to a few teachers about their experience as a participant in the race and this is what they had to say:

<u>Miss Hooker</u>

On the 17th October 2021, Miss Hooker ran and completed The Great South Run with a time of **1 hour, 6 minutes and 30 seconds**.

Additionally, she was the 27th woman to complete the race out of a total of 7629 other women.

She came 321st out of a total of 15,567 men and women.

Some words from Mr Were about his experience with The Great South Run:

"I did The Great South Run this year. I did it before in 1.21pb 4 years ago and completed it this year in **1.17pb**. I came 1311 out of 15567 (so not quite as good as Miss Hooker.)

It is hard, but not physically. I have been running for years, therefore doing 10 miles doesn't finish me off physically - it's the mental side that I find the hardest. Motivating yourself to run 10 miles is one thing, but to sustain the pace required to do a pb or to come in the top 10% of a race is what really weighs me down.

The crowd play a massive part and do push you on with their cheering. That is what seperates a proper race from just training. I didn't have much time for training prior to the run. I did one 10 miler 3 weeks before and it was 6 minutes slower! So that shows you how much of an effect a crowd can have!"

S'more Recipe

- 3. Put the s'mores on a hot barbecue and warm through for 2 mins on each side, so that the chocolate and marshmallows are just melted.
- 4. Remove and allow to cool slightly before carefully peeling off the foil. Serve immediately.



They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, not the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.


