## HEADTEACHER'S ADDRESS

The end of this term has had a much more positive and 'upbeat' feel to it, especially compared to this time last year. We have remained fully open and managed to run most events/activities and everyday life has been almost normal. This second half to the term has followed the same pattern to the start of the year. We have been fortunate to have experienced a much smaller number of Covid cases amongst the whole of the St Edmund's family.

Many of our problems and issues have focussed around access to supplies/services and being able to offer things consistently. This has been especially difficult for catering and meal provision. Suppliers have not been able to fulfil orders or on one occasion deliver anything at all. This obviously impacted on the menu and choice/quantity available.

Positively, all delays in work to the site have now been completed and we have reached our ambition of **providing ample cover/security for bikes as well as 'hotel' standard toilet facilities for our children. I will continue to** re-emphasise the importance of looking after these. Any deliberate damage will always result in a serious sanction, as would be the case in our own homes.

Throughout this term we have been working hard at re-energising the spirituality of our family. Fiona, our Chaplain, has enthused us all and I have been delighted with how much we have been able to do. There has been some great charity work for both our wider community and members of our own family. As we head towards 2022, there may be further struggles for families. Please do let us know if there are problems, especially in regards to uniform and activities. We want all of our children to have the same opportunities and to let that God-given talent shine out. I see that talent everyday in the hard work students put into their lessons and learning. Having recently observed teaching across the school, it was a pleasure to experience such a range of learning opportunities and an exceptionally high quality of education. We should be very proud of our children and the work they do. We will have a chance to celebrate this next term when we have our reward assemblies.

There have been a huge number of extra-curricular clubs and activities this term including some amazing sporting success in badminton, football, basketball and table tennis. We have a number of students who compete at a national level in an array of sports including swimming, boxing, football and basketball to name just a few. Amazing dedication and a great deal of support makes this happen.

Further talents were seen during the school production of 'Our Day Out.' This has been the first time we have squeezed in a production into the autumn term. Some terrific acting and a fantastic confidence builder for all those involved. Thank you to all those who came to watch and support.

Finally I would like to thank staff for their hard work, dedication and commitment. Congratulations to Mrs Edwards and Mrs Dale who received their 25 years of service for working within Portsmouth. A terrific achievement. Thank you to parents for all your support and hard work. So much of our children's success is as a result of that wrap around support they get. Please be mindful of the school's expectations on uniform, especially hair cuts/styles (no shorter than grade 2 or coloured hair), piercings (only 1 pair of small studs or sleepers) and jewellery. We try to be as consistent as possible and ensure that our learning arrangements/ethos remain as was shared with you on selecting St Edmund's.

Hopefully you are now aware of the school plans for re-opening in January 2022. Whilst it is undoubtedly a burden on the school/staff to test students upon return, it will ensure as safe a return as possible. So although our children **may not be 'straight back', we can have the reassurance that we are ready to continue our learning for the Spring** term.

May the love of Christ fill your home and family with the divine presence of Jesus Christ. Let this Holy season be peaceful, joyful and may God looks down upon you with much love and fortune.








2021 and the students have produced outstanding work. Within their sketchbook students have experimented with a wide

Year 8 students are currently working hard on their Marine Panel's. They are currently learning Textiles techniques such as Applique and Couching to add embellishment to their work.

Within year 9 students are currently adding textiles techniques to their fairs, carnivals and circus themed cushion cover. They have just completed the technique Batik where they have learnt how to draw with wax.

The choir joined with pupils from St John's Catholic Primary School to sing a song called 'One World'. 

Finally, well done to Year 7 for making their animal pencil holders - you have all worked extremely hard this term .

Thank you to everyone who purchased a poppy during our Poppy Appeal. We haven't received the official amount raised from the British Legion, but the collection pot was incredibly heavy when it was handed over!







For my Art homework, I decided that the animal I will design will be a giraffe. I made my giraffe using an application on my laptop called Paint 3D. I made my background first. It was supposed to replicate an African sunset and I made a gradient of red using the oil brush tool on the application. It ended up looking something like this:

#### Cool right?

Then I drew a tree for the giraffe to graze on. I used the marker tool. Firstly, I drew the tree by changing the marker to a brown colour then filling it. At first, I used the fill tool, but that made my tree too thick and uneven in some places, so I did it manually with the marker tool. Then I made the bushy leaves by doing the same process, except this time the marker was green, but I still filled it manually.

Adding that to the background made the picture look like this. The giraffe was the most difficult part. I switched to the 3D shapes tool and used a 3D oval for the giraffe's torso. For the neck I used the 3D capsule and for the head I used a 3D hemisphere. I decided to have my giraffe's legs squatting so I used a 3D curved cylinder which I think made it a bit more realistic. Then I coloured each part of the giraffe a matching orange. For the spots on the giraffe, I switched to 2D shapes and used a dark-coloured hexagon. I placed those hexagons around the giraffe's body to make it look like an actual giraffe.

I think my work would have been better if I made the tree 3D like my

giraffe, but oh well. I have created a photo album dedicated to my homework. To make animals as close to realistic as possible, I took various photos of myself in real life and edited it in. The bendy giraffe legs also helped it look like it was walking on my shoulder (though it obviously was not). I was able to transform the giraffe into real life by switching to mixed reality when I was taking the far-out shots of the giraffe and its habitats. I knew how to do this as I had used it before when I was messing around a couple of months ago.














## YEAR 9 Miss Tudor

As I write this Christmas newsletter, Year 11 have started their Mock GCSE exams. Their teachers have prepared them well and they are taking this as an opportunity to revise carefully and get an idea of what it will be like in May, June and July 2021. As we are still living in uncertain times, these Mock exams are as important as ever. Even with Exam prep in full swing this half term, we have had other events taking place that have seen our year group flourish.



Our first PHSE day took place on the 16th of November with pupils completing a Mock Interview day organised by our Careers

Advisor Mrs Halford. We had around 25 different employers from different work sectors interview each pupil in year 11 and give personised feedback. The volunteers were very impressed with how seriously the year group approached the interviews and how well prepared they were. One interviewer's feedback included that we "had the next Prime Minster amongst the year group" – high praise indeed.

Our Head girl **Nadia said: "The mock interview day was a good opportunity to practice talking about yourself and** things you enjoy partaking in. I also appreciated having the benefit of getting to meet someone in a similar field that I was interested in. Additionally, it was also as good insight into other potential areas I may want to go into and other ways I could further my education in them."

Further we also had session on Consent which allowed for very mature conversations and a safe space for the students to have guided discussions. One of our senior Prefects, **Paige, said "I** thought the consent session was engaging especially with the different activities that we did like the true and false; it opened **people's eyes to those sorts of things by using statistics"** Pupils also had an opportunity to evaluate what makes a good CV which pupil found very useful and helpful for work experience.

We have had many further education providers give information in assemblies this term as pupils have been told to apply for college places before Christmas. I know that Mrs Halford has helped pupils to apply on line or to complete their paper applications. Many who have applied have already had their interviews and lots have received their offer of a place. Congratulations to those who have been successful. There are a lot of opportunities in the local area to not only apply for a variety of college types but also to start in the workplace and get an apprenticeship.

Attendance has been good this year but to be able to go to the Prom in June, students will only be invited if their attendance is 95%. The first wave of Prom tickets will be sent out at the end of January 2022. Please be reminded that in accordance to the Local Authority and **the School's Attendance Policy, school** must be informed **of a child's absence daily by 9 am to the school's absence** line and a note with supporting medical evidence is provided on the **pupil's** return to school. Mock exams and the real exams always start at 8.25 when they are in the morning and students need to be lining up at 8.20 to be ready to go into the exam hall at 8.25. GCSE exams cannot be moved under any circumstance. Please can you ensure that your child arrives on time for school EVERY day.

The spring term is crucial for pupils to give 100% effort so that can reach and exceed their target grades. Departments will begin revision sessions after February half term, after school, and it is essential that students use all the support and help that teachers are organising to give them. As we prepare to welcome back Mrs Were next term from maternity leave, I d like to take this opportunity to thank you all for being so welcoming and supportive in my role. Our students are very lucky to have such caring guardians. I have felt very privileged to be the pastoral lead for year 11 and I hope to see them around school continuing to grow as the year goes on.
