


FARADAY CHALLENGE CHAMPIONS

On the 31st January 2022 Mrs Halford accompanied six Year 8 students to take part in 'The Faraday Challenge' at the new Technology Centre based at The University of Portsmouth. The challenge was sponsored and run by the Institute of Engineering and Technology. The students were

briefed and asked to create "a product to make a child or parent's stay in hospital that little bit easier". The students were up against five other schools and were assessed throughout the day with the final assessment comprising of a five minute presentation to the Judges and other participants,

Our final score totalled 88% which not only meant we had won on the day but also places St Edmund's as second on the National League Table which is an amazing achievement. The students won a fantastic trophy and each received a voucher for £10. If the students remain in the top five by the end of the competition, they will be invited to take part in the National Final in Liverpool with an all expenses paid trip and a chance for their prototype to be created and installed in the Alder Hey Children's Hospital and win £1000 for the school.

extremely high.'

Year of the EUCHARIST

I would describe this term as being 'Life -giving' because so many wonderful things have taken place to enhance the life of our school. It is good at times, to stop and reflect upon the blessings of life and so here are some of the Blessings of our Spiritual Journey during this term.

Our Year 8 Tutor Masses started this term. It has been wonderful preparing for our Mass by engaging in Lectio Divina; reflecting and praying with the Gospel of the day. Students shared many insights and I look forward to the Tutor Masses next term.

We have two St Vincent De Paul groups which meet on a Monday during the various lunchtimes. The meetings have been vibrant and it has been up-lifting spending time praying and sharing ideas in preparation for the season of Lent. Our Rosary Group meet every Tuesday lunchtime and lead the Rosary each week. During this time, we pray for the needs of our school, families, local area and our world.

I have thoroughly enjoyed the Chaplaincy Meetings this term. We have a large number of students in Chaplaincy and therefore had 3 separate meetings, one for Year 7, Year 8, and Year 9. We spent time in prayer and



'The Year of the Eucharist' was the theme for a week of assemblies. We spent time looking at the five hopes that the Bishops have for this 'Year of the Eucharist', as well as praying and singing and celebrating being 'Eucharistic People'. Our Journey is about being a praying community; drawing strength from Jesus and reaching out to others.

As you may be aware Pope Francis has asked the whole Catholic Church worldwide to engage in a process of discernment under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. (2021-2023) A Synod is a gathering of Church leaders from across the world who discuss the journey, and the future, of the Catholic Church. Pope Francis is asking Catholics across the world to listen to each other and to reflect deeply and prayerfully on what we have heard. We are being asked to consider, "What changes need to made - in myself, in our parishes, and in the diocese - to make the Church's mission today more vibrant and effective?" All the responses from gatherings like this across the world will be discerned at various levels and finally be presented to the Holy Father when he meets with the Bishops of the Church at a large Synod meeting in October 2023. So, a number of students from Year 8 - Year 11 met with me, in the Chapel to fulfil this process. It was a dynamic discussion and amazing to see our young people entering passionately into this discussion.

And finally, the fantastic news of the term was that we were awarded our second Level of the Romero Award; the Developer Level. The award shows how Catholic Social Teaching permeates all aspects of our school life at **St Edmund's. Much evidence was gathered and sent off as part of the application. On 12**th January, two Validators came into visit the school to validate our application. They met with me, a Governor, Senior Management, a number of staff as well as having a Tour with some of our St Vincent De Paul Group. So, we are delighted to end the term on such a positive note. As part of the Year 8 RE curriculum on evil and suffering, students have been learning about the Holocaust. The students were given a very personal and unique learning experience using TikTok. Miss Berry made a compilation of content that had been created by Holocaust survivor Lily Ebert. We asked some students to give their review on the videos made by Lily and to share their thoughts about her and what they found most interesting. As part of Mr Maguire's lesson, he encouraged 8 Damien to create pieces of poetry reflecting on Maximilian Kolbe's sacrifices during this time. The students looked at two pieces of Holocaust poetry to help inspire their own pieces.

During these last lessons we have learnt a lot about the Holocaust, for example: We have learnt that the Holocaust was a huge mass extermination of the Jewish community. In larger amounts the Jewish Germans, Jewish Dutch and Jewish Polish where taken to two main types of camps; firstly, labour camps; horrible places where the Jewish were forced to work making ammunition, clothes, food, bombs and more. If you where sent to one of these camps you where seen as lucky compared to the next camps. The other camps were extermination camps. In these hell pits, you would be stripped of any dignity you had left, forced to live in tiny cramped housing with very little to eat and dirty water to drink. If you didn't die of hypothermia, hunger or illness you would be dragged into the chambers which were pumped full of Zyklon B gas, which would cause a long and painful death.

In modern day, we can see that the chambers are filled with scratches, a sign of desperate cries for help; further more huge piles of shoes lay as a sign of the mass murder which took place all those years ago. There was a third type of camp called the ghetto. These were small communities where the Jewish could live and work (but conditions were very bad). They would be forced to wear a Star of David on their arms (a sign to all that saw them). However, you where still not safe in these as at any time you could be taken out and killed on the street. Holocaust Memorial Day is a day all around the world on which we remember all that was lost during the Holocaust and all who were lost. As we've never experience anything like this we must learn about it so it never happens again and no one ever forgets the lives lost during that horrible, hellish time. The Jewish were not the only people targeted; black people, homosexuals, gypsies and those who were disabled were also rounded up and sent to the camps as they did not fit in to Hitler's Germany.

"We learnt about what life was like in a

concentration camp from someone who experienced it first hand. By watching the video we got to feel her true emotions on what she had felt. Learning about the horrors that the Jewish community lived through although it was quite disturbing was interesting, but we need to learn about it to ensure that it never happens again."

I'm proud of who I am, I got the better of Hitler. I was belittled, but now I am greater than ever I'm with God, free of suffering The Key is found, I'm let out.





Chinese New Year is a year when Chinese people gather together and celebrate with their family. They have dinner together and celebrate this day. They also have a lot of traditional Chinese foods for dinner like dim sum and sweet dumplings. The food has a lot of meaning in China.





Chinese people also give out red pockets. This tradition is where people give out red pockets to the young families and friends but only if they are married, they (the younger family's) usually goes up to the elder and say words that wish them luck, wealth and health before the elder gives them their red pocket. Red pockets (like an envelope) are used because its meaning is to give the young ones luck and riches.

The Chinese Zodiac is made up by lots of animals. There is a mouse, cow, tiger, rabbit, dragon, snake, horse, sheep, monkey, chicken, dog and pig. This year 2022, is the year of tiger.

A lot of people may ask why is red the main colour in Chinese New Year? It is because the colour red in Chinese tradition represents the symbol of prosperity and a great fortune. The colour red is also used in a lot of things and places like the Red Pocket and Fai Chun. There is also a Chinese story of Nian. In ancient

times, there was a monster called "Nian", that was





created from the lion and unicorn. It lived in the mountains and would come down harm people and livestock and people have no way or method to defeat the Nian. One time a Nian entered a village, and the villagers coincidentally were wearing red, burning bamboo poles which were making crackling and explosive sounds, and bright light. The Nian was frightened and channelling panic. From then on the people knew how to beat the monster. Nian is actually the Chinese word for year.

During the Nian, each and every family furnish their door to their home in red, and burn firecrackers to drive Nian out. People that have the Nian, beat gongs and sound drums, and call to each other "Congratulations," "have a happy Spring festival". What is Fai Chun? A Fai Chun is a red poster that is put up everywhere in a Chinese home or where people are celebrating. On the Fai Chun there are words in Chinese that represent luck, wealth, health, money and wishes to people. We celebrated the Chinese New Year here at St Edmund's. The canteen served a delicious Chinese banquet of food and students worked in the LLRC with our Chinese bi-lingual assistant from EMAS creating an amazing display.

YEAR 11 Mrs Were














Our talented artists have really worked hard and I am pleased to showcase some of their outstanding pieces of Art that has been created so far this year. Well done to everyone! Mr Waddington

Over all, the experience was incredible and he provides us with enough knowledge to build on what we already knew. It was a really enjoyable experience.






Year 8 became Detectives looking at the Jack the Ripper case and created their own theory as to who the elusive perpetrator was.

Who was to blame for Jack the Ripper not being caught?


