HEADTEACHER'S ADDRESS

Although a very short half term, it has been packed with a variety of activities, trips, clubs and some amazing class learning. I have witnessed students working incredibly hard in their lessons, seen some fantastic homework and contribute massively to the life of school. Things here in school have definitely returned to the 'status quo'.

This half term in particular, we have seen the incredible amount of hard work students in Year 11 and Year 10 have been putting in to their GCSE examinations. If students wish to do the best they can, then there is an enormous amount of revision, learning and practise required of them. The support of staff has been a vital factor in helping our children in their quest to achieve their best. Our aim is to help our young people to the next stage of their **journey with the skills at St Edmund's, qualifications and personal traits required for a successful life. GCSE** examinations are the end point of this. The attitude that students have at this point is developed and nurtured throughout Key Stage 3 (Years 7 - 9). I am constantly inspired listening to students talk about how tests have gone and whether they are Secure or Advancing in their subjects.

This positive attitude/approach, combined with the skills and experiences gained, create wonderful young adults. Of course there can be bumps in the road and children (like adults) must face these, accept responsibility/repercussions and learn from them.

Thank you as always to parents/carers for supporting our children (and us) in getting those basics right; uniform, homework, punctuality, no phones/jewellery etc. These foundations and our insistence on these each day ensure that we have the high standard of teaching and learning and supportive family environment.

The 'secret weapon' for us and our children is our faith. The spirituality of the school, prayer, reflection, love and hope are at the core of what we do. The end of term Easter service at the Cathedral was truly moving. During the recent school Mass (for all Catholic schools in the Diocese), St Edmund's led/played the key role in all aspects of the Mass. A special mention to the choir and altar servers who were magnificent. The Year 9 Vocations morning was a fabulous experience for our children; seeing the faith journey of others in their lives. Next term we have two Year groups with Retreats (Years 8 &10). These are spiritual experiences for our children, as we promised parents would happen and the key reason for choosing to send their children to be part of the St Edmund's family.

Finally, thank you to staff (and students) for the huge variety of additional things which have taken place this term. Spelling Bee, Catenians Speaking Competition, Sports clubs and fixtures, performances and the preparation for our next school production - Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat.

As you can see from the front cover, some children had a fantastic experience on the recent Ski/Rome trips which took place over Easter. We have our sports trip/tour of Barcelona this half term which again will develop those skills/experiences and leave lasting memories for our children. Finally, I must alert parents to the rise in students vaping and the easy accessibility of these for students to get. It has been a lovely term with many wonderful spiritual events taking place.

The students prepared for their Year 11 Leavers Mass with hymns, readings, prayers, altar servers, offertory procession and speeches.

'This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you.' This is part of the Scripture passage that Year 11 chose for their Leavers Mass and the part of Scripture that they took to go on their Leavers plaque at the back of the hall. They were reminded to remember this quote, and to remember that God loves them as they travel through life. It was a joyous occasion, ending with a medley of songs that the students would have learnt on Retreat in Year 7. Everyone joined in singing as well as doing the actions.

This term we concluded our Year 8 Tutor Masses. Each class came down during their RE lessons to prepare for their Tutor Mass through learning about the Eucharist, spending time looking at the Gospel and seeing how it is relevant in their lives (Lectio Divina) as well as being involved in the various ministries e.g., singing, reading, prayers, offertory, altar serving. Our local priests, then came in on a Friday to say the Mass with the students. All the Masses were unique, with each Tutor Group adding their own gifts and talents as well as being joy-filled and prayerful.



One of the highlights of the term was our Year 9 Vocation Morning. A variety of speakers were invited in to talk about their chosen vocation and to share about their journey in life. We had a young married couple, two Dominican Sisters, two priests, 3 Street Pastors and a young person studying at university. The speakers had a station around the gym and groups of Year 9 students spent time at each station listening to their stories and then had time for questions. Year 9 enjoyed the morning and found the speakers interesting as they talked about the value of faith in the various works they are involved in.

The Annual School's Mass took place this year. It was a real celebration of our Catholicity as it has been a little while since this has taken place. Our Choir provided the music. Our school also provided Altar Servers

and Ushers. Each school was also asked to provide Art Work for an Exhibition and so a number of our students submitted various pieces of lovely art. It was wonderful to see the gifts and talents of our students as well as their generosity in sharing their abilities through service to others.

Each Tuesday lunchtime we have a Rosary Group that come together to pray. The invitation to come and pray the Rosary is open to everyone in school. We invited students to come together to pray for Year 11 sitting their exams. It has been wonderful to see the response of our young students coming to the Chapel during their lunch break to pray for Year 11.


Year 11 Sociology

This reward trip was for fifteen Year 10 students studying for the Combined Science course to recognise their great start to their GCSE studies this year by giving them the opportunity to listen to lectures delivered by world-renowned Scientists at the cutting edge of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) research.






ROME 2022


