We have moved to the new Tech block for Electronics, where the facilities and equipment has been updated. Pupils are enjoying learning about Electronic Products and using the soldering equipment, wood work machines and the laser cutter.

We are using the laser cutter for Y7 and 8 to make a topper for their Handy timer (Y7) and the Electronic Game (Y8). This involves using a special software to design their logo, text and images on the template and then sending it to the Laser Cutter. The laser cutter then cuts, etches and engraves on the plastic material. It takes about 30 minutes to do this for the whole class.

Y9 are making the Flashing Alien. Once they have finished the soldering, they design and make the Alien figure on





MDF. This will then be cut by using the saw and filed to the required shape. Pupils decide where to drill the eyes where the flashing LED lights can be seen.

Well, old news you might say, that happened months ago, but it seems like only yesterday that we moved out of the main block into the purpose-built Technology building.








Now the air conditioning keeps the rooms at a good working temperature, making the working environment quite pleasant indeed!


Other differences are the purpose build computer desks, carefully colour coordinated with the carpets and other fittings. The computers themselves are easier to use, with the adjustable monitors. They are fast too!


